HISTORY HAPPENS! After half a decade, work begins on Mailboxes and Community Center,

Construction of our residential mailboxes has begun. George M. Oye, Inc., General Engineering Contractor, recently cleared and graded the 2.4 acre site located at the the end of Kailapa Street. The concrete pad has been poured and the access drive is in place, awaiting asphalt paving. Kailapa resident Alton Oye, is supervising the development.

In 2006 our community association Board of Directors began the planning and implementation that has resulted in providing our neighborhood with a readily accessible means of receiving mail without having to leave the community.

Then President David Kahanu, and fellow board members gathered ideas from the community, investigated funding sources and began the process to establish the association as a not-for-profit corporation. These were necessary ingredients to successfully meet resident desires for improved community services.

Among the difficulties in 2006 was a change in site location after the original mauka site offered by Hawaiian Homes for development was determined to be flood prone; The somewhat larger site makai of Kailapa Street became more viable. Aside from a \$25,000 DHHL grant used to fund the mailbox site, an additional \$100,000 contribution from Kohala Ranch developers, to provide a recreation area, had to be funneled through Hawaiian Homes for

disbursement. The latter funds are scheduled for release January 1, 2012. Kailapa's current Board has managed to create an efficient means of accomplishing several community objectives by incorporating them into this one site. President Diane Kaneali'i, along with the other current board have coordinated additional residents' efforts to construct a multi-purpose Hale for use as a community center adjoining the clustered mailboxes. Rest rooms and private meeting areas will be added in later phases. The area immediately surrounding the Hale will be landscaped and fenced to provide a playground for our keiki and a place where all residents can come to relax and appreciate our aina. Project completion is expected in the next 12 to 24 months as funding sources continue to be developed.

Thanks to the success of this event, The Trails Project has since used our presentation as a model for 2 more neighborhood events in Koloko/Honokohau and Honaunau. Congratulations to Donna and Maha as well as the many others who helped to make this a remarkable and successful event.

CULTURAL LEARNING CENTER NEAR PU'UKOHOLA

Kaleleonalani Foundation, working with 6 to 10 acres of land from Queen Emma's Estate, just announced plans for a Cultural Learning Center across the highway from Pu'u kohola Heiau. The facility will feature a repository for valuable Hawaiian artifacts that once played important roles in Kawaihae history as well as an indoor auditorium, outdoor amphi-theater and resource rooms for teaching and explaining valuable Hawaiian heritage programs. Three dimensional, full color holographic representations of the artifacts housed in the repository museum will be featured in displays at the complex.

Arthur Akau, Jr. and Mel Kalahiki held an informational meeting November 14 at the Hamakua Macadamia Nut Factory, at which time they explained they are seeking community input regarding the establishment of such a site in our neighborhood. They indicated the project would create 20-30 jobs here in the community. Food service will be included and
