TOPIC:	Income Limits for the NHHBG program under the Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination Act of 1996 (NAHASDA)

Purpose: This guidance replaces Program Guidance NHHBG 2021-01 and provides the latest Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Income Limits applicable to the Native Hawaiian Housing Block Grant (NHHBG) program.

Background: HUD Notice [PDR-2022-01P](https://www.huduser.gov/portal/datasets/il.html#2022) issued April 18, 2022, contains the latest published Median Family Income (MFI) limits that are applicable to establishing MFI limits for the NHHBG program. The income limits published in the HUD Notice are in effect for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022. They are calculated for each metropolitan and nonmetropolitan area using the Fair Market Rent (FMR) area definitions. Guidance: Pursuant to 24 CFR § 1006.10, median income for the NHHBG program is defined as:

With respect to an area that is a housing area [an area to which the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) is authorized to provide affordable housing assistance], the greater of:

- (1) the median income for the housing area, which shall be determined by HUD; or
- (2) the median income for the State of Hawaii.

Thus, if the income limit for a county located within the housing area is greater than the income limit for the State of Hawaii, the median income limit for the county must be used as the income limit for that housing area.

The HUD published, State of Hawaii median income limit by family size for FY 2022 is as follows:

The HUD published, County median income limits by family size for FY 2022 are as follows:

Therefore, in accordance with § 1006.10, the FY 2022 median income limits applicable to providing NHHBG assistance are:

To calculate the income limit for families with more than eight members, use the four-person income limit as the base amount. Multiply the base amount by increments of eight percent increasing for each additional person. DHHL may round the calculated income limits for nine or more persons to the nearest \$50 or DHHL may use the unrounded numbers.

1-person	2-person	3-person	4-person	5-person	6-person	7-person	8-person
70%	80%	90%	BASE	108%	116%	124%	132%

Using the four-person income limit as the base amount:...

9 person limit = 4 person limit x 140%

10 person limit = 4 person limit x 148%

Then round up to the nearest \$50, if DHHL chooses to do so.

Example: 9 person limit = 4 person limit x 140%

Using the Honolulu income limits, \$104,500 x 140% = \$146,300

Rounded up to the nearest \$50 = \$146,300

Thus, the nine-person income limit for Honolulu is **\$146,300**.
